






# Liturgical Colours

The colour of the liturgical vestments changes from time to time. This is because the Church uses different colours to indicate the season or feast that is being celebrated throughout the Liturgical Year.

<p>WHITE/GOLD</p> <p>Easter, Christmas</p> <p>This is a festive, joyful colour, that is used during Christmas and Easter seasons, and on major feast days.</p>	
<p>PURPLE VIOLET</p> <p>Lent, Advent</p> <p>This colour symbolises repentance and penance. Purple vestments are worn during the season of Lent.</p> <p>Violet vestments are often used in Advent.</p>	 
<p>GREEN</p> <p>Ordinary Time</p> <p>Green vestments are worn during Ordinary Time.</p>	
<p>RED</p> <p>Red is the colour that is used on Passion (Palm) Sunday, Pentecost Sunday and for Confirmation. It is also the colour that has been associated with martyrs – those who have shed their blood for their faith.</p>	
<p>Rose</p> <p>is an optional colour that may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent when the Church is called to rejoice.</p>
